# Premio Protagonistas del Cambio UPC (UPC Champions of Change Award), Peru

On April 28, the UPC Champions of Change Award was officially launched in Peru. An initiative of the Universidad Peruana de Ciencias Aplicadas (UPC), a member of the Laureate International Universities (LIU) Network, the awards program will select ten Fellows in 2011. Each will receive leadership training, mentoring, and a monetary award for their social change work. Learn more.

On May 3, the Youth Action Awards program was launched in Chile under the auspices of Universidad Andres Bello, an LIU Network member. ### Bilgi Young Social Entrepreneur Awards, Turkey

Young social innovators, ages 18-29, in Turkey, have until November 8 to apply for the <u>Bilgi Young Social Entrepreneur Awards</u>. The Awards, given out annually to ten accomplished young leaders, include customized training designed to strengthen the personal leadership and entrepreneurial skills of participants, and a USD 3,500 award. Launched in 2009, the Awards are managed by Istanbul Bilgi University, a member of the LIU Network, in partnership with the TEGV Foundation.

# Premio Universidad del Valle de México por el Desarrollo Social (UVM Prize for Social Development), Mexico

Young social entrepreneurs, ages 18 to 29, in Mexico have until September 12, 2011 to apply for the <a href="UVM Prize for Social Development">UVM Prize for Social Development</a> awarded to 15 outstanding young leaders annually. The Premio UVM fellowship strengthens the project management and communications skills of young leaders, while connecting them to their peers and experts to create a national network of youth leaders affecting positive change. This customized learning experience, and a 25,000 Mexican peso award to their project, allows Fellows to deepen their work and extend their impact.
